



## Lucy Johnson: Parliamentarian

The Role of the Parliamentarian

When I first attended my area CCW meetings 30 years ago, I was impressed that a parliamentarian was present, assisting the presiding officer. I continue be impressed. Having a parliamentarian at a meeting separates CCW from most other organizations that I'm involved with. What is the role of the parliamentarian, and who would be a good choice to serve in this role?



A parliamentarian is appointed by the president usually with the approval of the Board. It is not an elected position. The main role of a parliamentarian is to assist the presiding officer so that the meeting runs smoothly. While it is helpful to understand the basics of Robert's Rules, it more important to be familiar with the organization's bylaws and standing rules as well as

customs and traditions. Past-presidents make good parliamentarians for this reason.

It may appear that the parliamentarian "doesn't do anything" at the meeting. This is by design. Parliamentarians are to be objective and should not vote or enter into debate similar to the presiding officer. Both can vote if by ballot. Most of the work done by a parliamentarian occurs before and after the meeting. She should meet with the presiding officer to draft the agenda and help write out the words to say during a meeting. Copies of the agenda and script should also be given to the secretary who can use them as an outline for the minutes.

There are many resources available, leadership training, and refresher courses to help understand parliamentary procedure. For example, NCCW has a wonderful brochure called "Ask the Parliamentarian" which can be downloaded from the website. The NCCW Leadership Training Development (LTD) program has segments on parliamentary issues. Additionally, there is a National Association of Parliamentarians that has state and local chapters which provide periodic trainings and meetings. The possibilities are endless!

Jeannette Schaal documented a beautiful history for Friends of WUCWO 10 year anniversary. It was suggested that we continue updating our history.


A committee was appointed with Bonnie Workman, Chair, Deb Drager, Marilyn Ericksen and Myrna Wong.

The Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace and the International Union of Superiors General has designated **February 8** as an annual day of prayer and awareness against human trafficking.

February 8 is the feast day of St. Josephine Bakhita, who was kidnapped as a child and sold into slavery in Sudan and Italy. Once Josephine was freed, she became a Canossian nun and dedicated her life to

sharing her testament of deliverance from slavery and comforting the poor and suffering. She was declared a saint in 2000.

On February 8, Catholics all over the world are encouraged to host or attend prayer services to create greater awareness about this phenomenon. Through prayer, we not only reflect on the experiences of those that have suffered through this affront to human dignity, but also comfort, strengthen, and help empower survivors.

In the words of the committee chairman for migration,
Bishop Eusebio Elizondo, M.Sp.S.: "If just one person realizes from this
day that they or someone they know is being trafficked, we will have
