

Hour of Prayer for the 100th Anniversary of the National Council of Catholic Women

****Leader's Guide--***This document is designed for planning purposes. It includes the full texts of Sacred Scripture passages, multiple hymn/song options, and other prayers and litanies in their entirety. A shorter service program is available for attendees that requires less printing.*

(This prayer service could begin with a period of Adoration if time permits.)

Prayer to the Holy Spirit

(Leader) Come Holy Spirit,
Fill the hearts of your faithful,
And kindle in them the fire of your love.
Send forth your Spirit,
And they shall be created,
And you shall renew the face of the earth.

(*All*) O, God, who by the light of the Holy Spirit, did instruct the hearts of the faithful, grant that by the same Holy Spirit we may be truly wise, loving, and courageous leaders and ever enjoy His consolations. Through Christ Our Lord, Amen.

- For the constant focus of our organization on leading our members to work to establish your Kingdom here on earth and to attain the eternal Kingdom; **R**.
- For the nourishment the NCCW provides members who search for spiritual enrichment, seek to develop leadership abilities, and have a willingness to serve others; **R**.
- For the insight of our commissions in developing relevant programs that enable our members to help others; **R**.
- For the many NCCW office staff members that are, and have been, so dedicated to our efforts; **R**.
- For the many Spiritual Advisors that guide, assist, and support our affiliates; **R**.
- For the talents that shine in our members as they work in our affiliates and in parishes; **R**.
- For giving our women continued persistence in accomplishing our NCCW Mission at all levels; **R**.

(First Reader)

A reading from the Book of Ruth (1:1-18) (NABRE)

(Please *stand*)

(Second Reader)

A reading from the Gospel according to St Luke (1:39-45) (NABRE)

(Pause for reflection)

Hymn (Please select an appropriate Marian song)

Magnificat (Jacques Berthier) Hail Mary, Gentle Woman (text, Hail Mary, altered Carey Landry) Immaculate Mary (Lourdes hymn-public domain)

(Brief readings from the four female Doctors of the Church. You may wish to designate four different readers.)

Leader: Some of the greatest examples of spirituality, leadership, and service come from the four women Doctors of the Church. These women have been given this designation by the Church for their eminent learning and high degree of sanctity, exemplified in their writings. Let us listen and reflect on their words.

St. Hildegard of Bingen 1098-1179

Canonized in May 2012 – Named a Doctor of the Church in October 2012 by Pope Benedict XVI

"Listen: there was once a king sitting on his throne. Around Him stood great and wonderfully beautiful columns ornamented with ivory, bearing the banners of the king with great honour. Then it pleased the king to raise a small feather from the ground, and he commanded it to fly. The feather flew, not because of anything in itself but because the air bore it along. Thus am I, a feather on the breath of God."

From her first major visionary work Scivias (or Sci vias Domini, Know the Way of the Lord)

(pause for reflection . . . Leader: Envision yourself as a feather on the breath of God.)

"O great the wonder that in a hidden female body a king entered. God did this as humility rises above all. And O great the happiness in that woman, because the evil that came from woman, this one then swept away. She built up sweet-smelling virtues and adorned Heaven yet more than she had first marred earth."

Marian Antiphon, Number 11, Hildegard of Bingen: A Visionary Life by Sabina Flanagan page 110.

(pause for reflection Leader: Think on ways to grow closer to the Mother of Jesus.)

St Catherine of Siena 1347-1380

Canonized in June 1461 by Pope Pius II – Named a Doctor of the Church in October 1970 by Pope Paul VI

"You have said, Eternal Father, that through the love which You have for Your rational creatures and the prayers and the many virtues and labors of Your servants, You would do mercy to the world, and reform the Church, and thus give us refreshment; wherefore do not delay, but turn the eye of Your mercy towards us, for You must first reply to us before we can cry out with the voice of Your mercy. Open the door of Your inestimable love which You have given us through the door of Your Word."

The Dialogue of St. Catherine of Siena, A Treatise of Prayer, How this devout soul, praising and thanking GOD, made a prayer for the Holy Church.

(pause for reflection: Leader: reflect on how you can pray and act to help renew Christ's Church)

"Oh eternal Trinity! oh Godhead! Which Godhead gave value to the Blood of Your Son, You, oh eternal Trinity, are a deep Sea, into which the deeper I enter the more I find; and the more I find the more I seek; the soul cannot be satiated in Your abyss, for she continually hungers after You, the eternal Trinity, desiring to see You with light in Your light."

The Dialogue of St. Catherine of Siena, A Treatise of Obedience, How this most devout soul, thanking and praising God, makes prayer for the whole world and for the Holy Church, and commending the virtue of faith brings this work to an end.

(pause for reflection ... Leader: Do you truly hunger for God? How can you increase that hunger?)

"If you are what you should be, you will set the whole world ablaze."

St. Catherine of Siena in a letter to Father Dom Stefano Marconi, adapted by St. Pope John Paul II at World Youth Day 2000.

(pause for reflection: Leader: Are you truly living up to what you should be? How can you be more?)

St. Teresa of Avila 1515-1582

Canonized in March 1622 by Pope Gregory XV – Named a Doctor of the Church in September 1970 by Pope Paul VI

"Let nothing disturb you, let nothing frighten you, all things pass away: God never changes. Patience obtains all things. He who has God finds he lacks nothing. God alone suffices."

Poem found in St. Teresa's breviary, in her own handwriting, as cited on October 15, 2015 by Gretchen Filz at getfed.com

"The soul may also place itself in the presence of Christ, and accustom itself to many acts of love directed to His sacred Humanity, and remain in His presence continually, and speak to Him, pray to Him in its necessities, and complain to Him of its troubles; be merry with Him in its joys, and yet not forget Him because of its joys. All this it may do without set prayers, but rather with words befitting its desires and its needs."

(pause for reflection . . . **Leader:** These two quotes speak to the heart of trusting in and resting in God's presence. How do you find rest in Him?)

St. Therese of Lisieux 1873-1897

Canonized in May 1925 by Pope Pius XI – Named a Doctor of the Church in October 1997 by Pope John Paul II

"You know well that Our Lord does not look so much at the greatness of our actions, nor even at their difficulty, as at the love with which we do them."

Excerpts from a letter written October 20, 1888 as quoted in The Story of a Soul, Epilogue, Letters of Sister Therese to her sister, Celine.

"Dear Jesus! tis Thy Holy Face Is here the start that guides my way; Thy countenance, so full of grace, Is heaven on earth, for me, today.

... Oh, leave on me some impress faint. Of Thy sweet, humble, patient Face, And soon I shall become a saint, And draw men to Thy saving grace.

So, in the secret of Thy Face, Oh! hide me, hide me, Jesus blest! There let me find its hidden grace, Its holy fires, and, in heaven's rest, Its rapturous kiss, in Thy embrace!"

Excerpts of "Canticle to the Holy Face" written August 12, 1895, translation quoted in the First Part of "Poems of St. Teresa, Carmelite of Lisieux, known as the 'Little Flower of Jesus'" in *The Story of a Soul*.

(*All*) Heavenly Father, bless us, our families, our parishes, and the work of the National Council of Catholic Women as we now place these petitions before You with heartfelt humility knowing they will be answered in Your time and according to Your will through Christ Our Lord. Amen.

Leader: To conclude this time of prayer and reflection together, let us now, as members and friends of the National Council of Catholic Women, recite the Centennial Anniversary Prayer recognizing the priceless gift this organization is to all Catholic women.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen.

(*Additional texts for use throughout the program*) **A reading from the Book of Ruth (1:1-18)** (*NABRE*)

Once back in the time of the judges there was a famine in the land; so a man from Bethlehem of Judah left home with his wife and two sons to reside on the plateau of Moab. The man was named Elimelech, his wife Naomi, and his sons Mahlon and Chilion; they were Ephrathites from Bethlehem of Judah. Some time after their arrival on the plateau of Moab, Elimelech, the husband of Naomi, died, and she was left with her two sons. They married Moabite women, one named Orpah, the other Ruth. When they had lived there about ten years, both Mahlon and Chilion died also, and the woman was left with neither her two boys nor her husband.

She and her daughters-in-law then prepared to go back from the plateau of Moab because word had reached her there that the LORD had seen to his people's needs and given them food. She and her two daughters-in-law left the place where they had been living. On the road back to the land of Judah, Naomi said to her daughters-in-law, "Go back, each of you to your mother's house. May the LORD show you the same kindness as you have shown to the deceased and to me. May the LORD guide each of you to find a husband and a home in which you will be at rest." She kissed them good-bye, but they wept aloud, crying, "No! We will go back with you, to your people." Naomi replied, "Go back, my daughters. Why come with me? Have I other sons in my womb who could become your husbands? Go, my daughters, for I am too old to marry again. Even if I had any such hope, or if tonight I had a husband and were to bear sons, would you wait for them and deprive yourselves of husbands until those sons grew up? No, my daughters, my lot is too bitter for you, because the LORD has extended his hand against me." Again they wept aloud; then Orpah kissed her mother-in-law good-bye, but Ruth clung to her.

"See now," she said, "your sister-in-law has gone back to her people and her god. Go back after your sister-in-law!" But Ruth said, "Do not press me to go back and abandon you!

Wherever you go, I will go, Wherever you lodge, I will lodge. Your people shall be my people And your God, my God. Where you die, I will die, And there be buried.

May the LORD do thus to me, and more, if even death separates me from you!" Naomi then ceased to urge her, for she saw she was determined to go with her.

A reading from the Gospel according to St Luke (1:39-45) (NABRE)

During those days Mary set out and traveled to the hill country in haste to a town of Judah, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the infant leaped in her womb, and Elizabeth, filled with the holy Spirit, cried out in a loud voice and said, "Most blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And how does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? For at the moment the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the infant in my womb leaped for joy. Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."
